## **Executive Summary**

During 2023, members of the department responded to 4,179 emergency calls. Members completed 5,378 fire safety and housing inspections and continued to expand our community outreach programs. The department continues to look forward to providing the very best in Fire, Rescue and EMS services to our municipality while being fiscally responsible to the people we serve. We will continue to live out our mission, vision, and core values on a daily basis to ensure that we do just that.

### Services Provided

Being able to provide a variety of specialized services, not customary to most fire departments, is what sets our department apart from others within our county.

The Wildwood City Fire Department continues to offer open water rescue responses during the "shoulder season" for our island community when the beach patrol is no longer in service. We also continue to support the A.L.E.R.T. (After-hours Lifeguard Emergency Response Team) in conjunction with the Wildwood Beach Patrol's unit in the summer evening hours when the beaches are closed.

The Wildwood City Fire Department is the co-lead agency for the Cape May County Regional Urban Search & Rescue team. This team specializes in Structural Collapse Rescue, Confined Space Rescue, High-Angle Rope Rescue, Surface Ice and Water Rescue and Trench Rescue. In 2023, team members completed monthly-based core discipline

training in various technical rescue disciplines to maintain their skills.

#### Training

The Officers and Firefighters of the Wildwood City Fire Department continuously further their education through officer development classes and tactical courses. Training and being prepared for the unknown is always at the forefront of our department.

During the 2023 calendar year the

department conducted several in-house training programs to maintain skills in various certification disciplines including but not limited to;

- Open Water Rescue
- Confined Space Rescue Operations
- Fire Suppression Operations Live-Fire Training

In addition to the classes held in-house, members spent hundreds of hours participating in fire, rescue, and emergency medical training throughout the year.









On December 8, 2023, Deputy Fire Chief Daniel Dunn graduated from the National Fire Academy's Executive Fire Officer Program. The National Fire Academy's Executive Fire Officer (EFO) Program is the pinnacle of the United States Fire Administration's (USFA) commitment to support the needs of fire and EMS agencies in preparing executive officers to meet the ever-changing demands of the dynamic communities in which they serve. It is the flagship program of the National Fire Academy (NFA). The EFO Program is structured to empower executive officers to develop, maintain, and expand the following proficiencies throughout their careers:

- Demonstrate social responsibility within self, organization, and community.
- Enhance personal and organizational ethics, integrity, accountability, and performance to secure public trust.
- Apply effective communication skills and information technologies to express vision, strategy, policy, resource, and incident-related determinations.
- Strategically plan to foster a safe, healthy, prepared, and resilient community.
- Incorporate diversity, equality, equity, and inclusiveness to build organizational and community strength.
- Prioritize personal and organizational growth through the pursuit and creation of education, mentorship, and other learning opportunities.
- Exercise leadership to meet the technical and adaptive challenges within the organization and community.
- Employ political/strategic foresight and research-based analytical skills to propose, influence, adopt, implement, and evaluate public policy.

The program is a minimum of a two-year commitment to complete the requirements. The program culminates in the completion of a major Capstone Research Project to demonstrate bold and imaginative solutions to critical issues cultivated by the executive throughout the program.

The EFO Program began in 1985, approximately 38 years ago, and to date just over 4,700 fire and emergency service executive leaders have graduated from the program. This includes 42 fire and emergency services leaders from other countries. New Jersey has just 55 executive officers that have completed the program.





#### **Equipment and Funding Opportunities**

Through our Community Risk Assessments, the Wildwood City Fire Department continues to try and be well equipped and trained in order to provide the very best in emergency services for our residents and visitors. Being an urban city on an island with a tremendous tourist base in the busy summer season makes our municipality vulnerable.

The Wildwood City Fire Department has been very fortunate over the past several years to receive numerous grants that have helped us successfully fulfill our mission. These include two Federal Emergency Management (FEMA) Staffing for Adequate Fire & Emergency Response grants, Assistance to Firefighters Grants (AFG), United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Economic Impact Initiative for Purchase of Fire Equipment grant, the Lt. Joseph P. DiBernardo (Joey D) Foundation grant, and a New Jersey Department of Community Affairs American Rescue Plan Firefighters Grant.

In 2023, our department applied for another American Rescue Plan Firefighters grant through the New Jersey Department of Community Affairs. This grant was applied for to replace the Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) on Squad Co. 3. We await word on this grant opportunity. In addition, in 2023 we applied for the South Jersey Gas Company's First Responder Grant Program. We have applied for this highly competitive grant for several years and we are very thankful to have been awarded this grant in 2023. This grant award will fund the purchase of a new, state-of-the-art multi-gas meter that will assist our firefighters in detecting various hazardous materials situations.

Also in 2023, the Wildwood City Fire Department applied for a FEMA Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) grant for the hiring of four additional full-time firefighters. Unfortunately, our department was not selected for this highly competitive grant. We also applied for an Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG) for the purchase of a new pumper apparatus to replace our 27-year-old Engine Co. 3. Unfortunately, we were not selected for this grant either. These grants are highly competitive each year and we will continue to aggressively pursue them to help us increase our abilities to carry out our daily mission.

Our Department continues to actively seek and aggressively pursue any available grant funding that saves money for our taxpayers while at the same time improving the overall health and safety of our members. This also results in our Department having the most technologically advanced equipment available which increases our efficiency and abilities to respond as an All-Hazards emergency response organization.

### Barefoot Country Music Festival June 15-18, 2023

Once again, the largest special event staffed by WFD members during 2023 was the Barefoot County Music Festival. This was the third year for the four-day event that featured some of country music's hottest and talented artists. Headliners for the show included Blake Shelton, Kid Rock, Darius Rucker, Hardy, and Jon Pardi. The event was a huge success and a great event that benefited businesses throughout the island. During the four-days, Wildwood Firefighters had 197 patient contacts, the majority of which were for minor cuts and scrapes requiring bandages. Only six patients required transport to the hospital over the four days. This event once again displayed all that the City of Wildwood has to offer in a safe, family oriented venue.

I would like to thank Public Safety Commissioner, Steve Mikulski, for his unwavering support for our department. I look forward to working with Commissioner Mikulski, Commissioner Krista Fitzsimons, and Mayor Ernie Troiano Jr. in 2024.

The City of Wildwood Fire Department remains committed to our community far beyond the scope of firefighting. Understanding that it takes a village to raise a child, we remain partnered with the Wildwood Public School District and youth organizations throughout the island. Our goal is to assist these organizations in their efforts to provide our youth, the future of our community, with the guidance and support they need to grow into successful adults.





## About Us

The City of Wildwood is a 1.3 square mile seashore resort City that is a popular summer tourist destination for hundreds of thousands of visitors each year. As of the 2020 census the City has a population of 5,157 which can swell to 250,000 or more during the peak summer season. The City is famous for its large boardwalk with numerous shops, restaurants, amusement piers and waterparks, and for being home to the World's largest, finest, and safest bathing beach. The City is home to many hotels/motels, apartment/rooming houses, bed and breakfasts, restaurants, bars/nightclubs, as well as many condos and single family residences.

The City of Wildwood has a combination-type Fire Department consisting of a career division and a volunteer division. The Department is led by the Career Fire Chief who has overall responsibility for the administration of the Department. In addition to the Fire Chief there is a Deputy Fire Chief, who along with the Fire Chief, handles administrative and operational duties. The career division consists of 4 platoons with a Captain and 4 firefighters assigned to each platoon. In addition, the career division is supplemented by part-time staff to increase staffing levels during the busy summer season and backfill career personnel when they are off. The Fire Prevention Bureau is headed by the Fire Official and has one full-time and one part-time fire inspector assigned. The Volunteer Division consists of the Holly Beach Fire Company # 1 and the Wildwood Fire Company # 1. Although the volunteer companies are no longer operational for emergency responses, they continue to support the fire department in many ways. The City of Wildwood Fire Department is an allhazards response organization providing fire suppression, emergency medical services (Basic-Life Support Transport), technical/heavy rescue (high-angle rope rescue, confined space rescue, vehicle extrication, open water rescue, surface ice rescue, hazardous materials, and trench rescue response), fire prevention, code enforcement, and emergency management services.

The City of Wildwood Fire Department protects the municipality with 1-Squad Company, 1-Quint Company, 1-Rescue Company, 1-Engine Company, 4 BLS Ambulances and several support vehicles including a water rescue/utility vehicle for the beach and several 5-ton high-water vehicles. In 2023, the City of Wildwood responded to over 4,100 emergency incidents.

The City of Wildwood Fire Department is proud to have an ISO Class 3 designation and we continuously strive to better that classification.

## **Facilities and Apparatus**

The City of Wildwood Fire Department maintains facilities and apparatus to ensure timely and efficient responses to emergencies. The department has three stations. However, Fire Headquarters is the only operating station for emergency responses and Station's 3-1 and 3-2 are currently used for storage of additional and reserve apparatus.

### Fire Stations:

### Fire Headquarters – 4400 New Jersey Avenue

Headquarters is located within the City Hall building, between City Hall and the Police Department. The offices of the Fire Chief, Deputy Fire Chief and the Fire Prevention Bureau are all located on the second floor of Headquarters. Administrative staff for the Fire Chief's Office and the Fire Prevention Bureau are located here as well. The City's Emergency Operations Center (EOC) is also located at Fire Headquarters.

The Career Division firefighters are located in Headquarters on the first floor. The on-duty platoon handles all emergencies called into the City of Wildwood Fire Department with the following apparatus being assigned to Headquarters:

2017 – 2000 GPM Pierce Squad (first due apparatus)
2014 – 2000 GPM E-One Quint
2020 – Ferrera Heavy Rescue
2007 – Dodge Ram 2500 (beach response apparatus)
Two – BLS Transport Ambulances (first due)
2020 – Medstat ASAP UTV (special event EMS unit)

### Station 3-1 – 4310 Washington Avenue (Holly Beach)

Station 3-1 is located directly across from Fire Headquarters and houses the volunteer division of the department. Although we currently do not utilize this building for fire responses it still houses reserve equipment. The company members of this station still hold their monthly meetings and maintains the charter of the company which was organized in1884. The station currently houses the following apparatus:

2002 – Chevy utility vehicle (Fire Police) 2010 – Army cargo 5-ton vehicle (flood responses-fire suppression) 2009 – Army cargo 5-ton vehicle (flood responses-fire suppression) 2010 – Army cargo 5-ton vehicle (flood responses-evacuations)

### Station 3-2 – 111 East Pine Avenue (Pine Avenue)

Station 3-2 is located in the northern-end of the city and houses the volunteer division of the department. Although we currently do not utilize this building for fire responses it still houses reserve equipment. The company members of this station still hold their monthly meetings and maintains the charter of the company which was organized in 1896. The station currently houses the following apparatus:

## **Operations**

The fire department operations division is managed by Deputy Fire Chief Daniel Dunn. Operations is the largest division of the fire department. Operations personnel respond to all requests for service.

In addition, personnel also continually conduct mandatory training requirements, assist in public education, conduct fire prevention inspections supporting the inspection

bureau, and maintain the fire stations and apparatus.

The ability to improve our service is generated through many ideas and initiatives that originate from the operational members. Their values, energy, commitment, and compassion drive many of the department's functions, programs, and activities throughout the year. The operations personnel are faced daily with accomplishing our mission to provide extraordinary service to the community.

### Major Incident: Electric Substation Fire July 7, 2023

On Friday July 7, 2023 just after noon, Squad Co. 3 and North Wildwood FD Ladder Co. 2 were dispatched to 505 W. Oak Ave. for a reported fire at the Atlantic City Electric Wildwood Substation. Deputy Chief Dunn (Deputy 3) arrived on scene and reported a working fire in the substation upon arrival. There were several small explosions heard coming from within the structure. The incident was quickly upgraded to a 1<sup>st</sup> alarm assignment. Responding offduty Wildwood firefighters were directed into the scene while other responding 1<sup>st</sup> alarm companies were directed to begin covering the island for multiple incidents resulting from the associated power outage on the island including occupied stalled elevators and activated fire alarms. A 2<sup>nd</sup> alarm was subsequently transmitted to assist with these additional incidents. After approximately 20 minutes after arrival, Atlantic City Electric advised that the complex had been de-energized and firefighter could safely enter to begin fire extinguishment. The fire was knocked down using multiple dry chemical fire extinguishers after approximately 30 minutes. Units operated on the scene on this hot July day for nearly 5 hours before clearing. The subsequent power outages persisted over the weekend with rolling power outages after that as Atlantic City Electric worked to install temporary infrastructure. This incident proved very challenging as it occurred during the very busy summer season. The Wildwood City Fire Department thanks all of our automatic and mutual aid partners for their assistance during this incident, as well as the Wildwood Police Department and Wildwood Public Works Department for their assistance. We also thank Atlantic City Electric for their professional response to this incident and the continued long-standing working relationship that we have with their company.

### Notable EMS Incident- Baby Delivery June 28, 2023

On June 28, 2023 Squad Co. 3 (C Platoon) was dispatched to a maternity at a local hotel. North Wildwood Fire Department Ambulance 2 was dispatched mutual aid as our ambulance was on another incident. Upon arrival of Squad Co. 3, Capt. Ryan Troiano, Firefighter Darrick Kobierowski, and Firefighter Tina Sacco found a female patient, pregnant with twins, who was going into labor. Ambulance 2 with Firefighter Matt Capone and Part-Time Firefighter Zergani arrived on scene. Due to the potential imminent birth, Firefighter Tina Sacco joined Ambulance 2's crew for transport to the hospital. While enroute to the hospital the crew had to pull over and delivered a baby boy, Jasaad, on the side of the Garden State Parkway. The crew continued transport to the hospital. Baby Jasaad was joined by his twin brother, Musaad, about a half hour or so later in the hospital. Mom and baby were all reported in good condition at the hospital. Firefighter Sacco and NWFD Firefighter Capone were reunited with Mom and the babies on July 2<sup>nd</sup>. Great teamwork by all involved and congratulations to all!



## **Fire Prevention Bureau**



The Bureau of Fire Prevention is headed by Fire Official Dave Bannon. Firefighter Mark Allen is detailed to the bureau as a Fire Inspector. During the busy summer season 2 parttime Fire Inspectors are hired to assist with the inspection work load. The personnel of the Bureau focus on all aspects of life safety. Their primary objective is to reduce preventable deaths, injuries, and property loss through public education programs, fire inspections of all commercial

and non-owner occupied occupancies, and through enforcement of the New Jersey Uniform Fire Code. The office also conducts and oversees NJ State Housing Inspections of Hotels and Multiple Dwellings.

The Bureau educates building owners and tenants while conducting fire safety inspections. This helps to gain voluntary compliance, as well as limit the number of repeat violations in the future. The fire inspectors conduct annual fire safety inspections of existing commercial properties each year which may result in follow-up inspections to ensure compliance.

In addition to conducting fire safety and housing inspections, the Fire Prevention Bureau is tasked with heading the department's public education and outreach program. On May 9, 2023, the bureau partnered with the City of North Wildwood Fire Prevention Bureau to sponsor the "After the Fire" educational program for the junior and senior classes at Wildwood High School. This program is presented by Alvaro Llanos and Shawn Simons who survived the Seton Hall Dormitory arson fire in South Orange, New Jersey on January 19, 2000. Alvaro and Shawn both sustained critical, life altering burn injuries in the fire. They speak to high school and college students across the country as advocates for fire safety and fire prevention. Their presentation is very moving and incredibly inspiring. We are grateful for the opportunity to have hosted Alvaro and Shawn locally and plan on having them back in the future.









## **Training & Education**

The Wildwood City Fire Department continues to maintain a high level of commitment and dedication to training. The city presents a unique geographic make-up with a number of high community risks to include high-rise buildings, confined spaces, amusement rides, and open bodies of water. Over the years, the fire service has evolved into an "all hazards" approach agency with the Wildwood City Fire Department being no exception. Firefighters are the initial responders to all water related emergencies to include, but not limited to, the bay, the beach during periods that the Lifeguards are off-duty, tidal flooding, and natural disasters.

Since the Wildwood City Fire Department embraces the "all hazards" approach our firefighters are highly trained to not only respond to the community's needs but to mitigate the hazards that are present. Members of the department spent well over 2,500 hours in over 50 topics in education in 2023. This includes nearly 500 hours of on-duty company-level training sessions, which equates to over 2,477 person-hours of training.



## **Special Units**

### Cape May County Regional Urban Search & Rescue Team

The Regional Urban Search & Rescue Team (CMC USAR) is a highly specialized team of fire department members trained in structural collapse rescue, confined space rescue, high-angle rope rescue, surface ice/water rescue, and trench rescue. The team is a county asset that responds to any such emergencies in Cape May County. The team also responds mutual aid to other Southern New Jersey counties as requested. The team is led by WFD Capt. Matthew Johnson who serves as the Cape May County ESF-9 Search & Rescue Coordinator. On February 24, 2023, the team was dispatched to Sea Isle City for a reported balcony collapse. Crews encountered an approximately 30 foot concrete balcony on the eighth floor that had collapsed onto the balcony below trapping a construction worker who was working on the balcony below at the time. Unfortunately, the construction worker was deceased, but team members still had the daunting task of safely removing his body. This challenging operation was successfully completed in about 8 hours. This incident again highlighted the need for specialized technical rescue capabilities within Cape May County for these low frequency, high risk events.






## **Office of Emergency Management**



Deputy Fire Chief Daniel Dunn heads the Office of Emergency Management (O.E.M.) for the City of Wildwood. The mission of the Emergency Management Division is to develop plans and procedures that provide effective responses to all threats facing the City of Wildwood. By developing and exercising the all-hazards plans, we strive to minimize the impacts of an emergency or disaster on our citizens, visitors, property, the environment, and the City of Wildwood.

The Emergency Management Division works closely with public and private sector partners to ensure we are able to coordinate during an emergency or disaster. This coordination requires planning and close relationships with local, county, state and federal partners.

During 2023, the Wildwood City Office of Emergency Management completed an annual review of the City's Emergency Operations Plan. Constant review and updating of this plan allows the City to be ready in the event of a disaster or emergency that requires the implementation and activation of various emergency support functions.





The Office of Emergency Management administers the Code Red community notification program. This program enables residents and visitors to sign up to receive a phone call or text message in the event of an emergency or natural disaster such as hurricanes, flooding, snow storms or nor'easters. In 2023, the OEM had to send out six emergency notifications for five significant weather events, all of which were coastal flooding/storm events.

With much of the city being low-lying areas, any time there is the possibility for flooding this system allows city officials to immediately contact those who have signed up for the notifications to be briefed on the latest projections of approaching storms.







September 11<sup>th</sup> is always remembered by the members of the fire department with the effect it had on our country and the fire service as a whole. In addition to working with the Business Improvement District (B.I.D) in 2023 to host the Annual September 11<sup>th</sup> memorial service at the Byrne Plaza, Firefighter Kevin Kelly coordinated the 7th Annual Wildwood September 11<sup>th</sup> Memorial Stair Climb. Each participant pays tribute to a FDNY firefighter by climbing or walking the equivalent of the 110 stories of the World Trade Center. In 2023, the climb was held at the Wildwoods Convention Center. 2023's climb raised money for the Tunnel to Towers Foundation. The event raised over \$5,000.00 for the foundation. This foundation, created in memory of FDNY Firefighter Stephen Siller who was killed in the line of duty on 9/11/01, supports the families of fallen first responders and veterans, as well as those catastrophically injured in the line of duty.





2023 7th Annual 9/11 Memorial Stair Climb




### 2023 Revenue

The Wildwood City Fire Department offsets many of the costs associated with the services we provide through various fees and permits. The department contracts with a billing agency to administer the fee collection associated with ambulance services.

The fire prevention fees are collected "in-house" with our administrative support staff located in Fire Headquarters.

In 2023, the Wildwood City Fire Department collected a total of **\$799,494.02**.



### Achievements: 2023

- Purchased new Personal Protective Equipment including new structural firefighting boots, gloves, hoods, and SCBA masks for all personnel as well as a new Respiratory Fit Test Machine with funding awarded through the New Jersey Department Community Affairs American Rescue Plan Firefighters Grant Program.
- Applied for and awarded a South Jersey Gas First Responder Grant for the purchase of a new, state-of-the-art, multi-gas meter.
- Hired two new firefighters and promoted a new Fire Captain and Fire Official to replace members who retired during the year.
- Placed new portable radios awarded from a FEMA Assistance to Firefighters (AFG) grant in service.
- Developed an Island-Wide Mass-Casualty Incident Response Guideline.
- Began initial stages of developing a strategic plan for the department.
- Continued and expanded all of our community outreach programs including the Adopt-A-School program.
- Successfully staffed the Barefoot County Music Festival.
- Hosted the "After the Fire" program in partnership with the North Wildwood Fire Prevention Bureau at Wildwood High School.
- Applied for a NJDCA American Rescue Plan Firefighter's Grant for the purchase of new SCBA's for Squad Co. 3 (first due suppression apparatus).

# Goals/Objectives: 2024

- Apply for a FEMA Assistance to Firefighters grant to purchase automatic chest compression (CPR) devices and new Automatic External Defibrillators (AED's).
- Apply for FEMA Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) grants for the hiring of additional career firefighters.
- Continue and expand all of our community outreach programs.
- Purchase new gas meter awarded through the South Jersey Gas Company First Responder Grant program.
- Review and update Departmental policies and procedures manual.
- Continue development of a strategic plan for the department.
- Conduct active threat/mass casualty training in conjunction with the Wildwood Police Department and our automatic and mutual aid partners.
- Continue to pursue all training and professional development opportunities.
- Conduct training with our automatic and mutual aid partners and continue to build cooperative relationships.
